In February in partnership with Merton Council, Rutlish School, and the Met Police I took, with the assistance of Mark Boakye, 50 pupils from years 7, 8 and 9 to an activity centre in Kent called Tree Jumpers on four separate one day visits. We attempted to choose boys from the school who are doing well, and some boys who are very new visitors to the country but have excelled despite in some cases some very tragic circumstances.

Learning outside the classroom is an important development opportunity for every child, and allows students to look at education and learning in a whole new light. In 99% of cases brings out their best qualities and strengths, whilst also identifying key areas of weaknesses to work on improving! Tree jumpers encourage active education supporting the government's campaign to cut child obesity levels, due to the range of activities on offer the students will be raising their heartbeat and using body muscles without even realising it!

We took part in Multi Activity days a great way of offering variety and a perfect way to Problem Solving, give students a taster of several activities in just one day

You combine Aerial Adventure with Archery.

The boys and staff got a lot out of the experience. On one trip I noted that four of the boys in our party had never left London. The school were assisted on two occasions by PCSO Nikki Cleeter who was an excellent asset to the partnership. The boys when they see her in a work setting will be far more likely to interact with her in a positive and meaning full way having seen her in a dynamic and helpful role.

It also helps me to build building blocks for the future between young people and the Police in general so that they will be more likely to trust and respect the service following such a rewarding experience.

It also helped the boys have confidence in themselves and the things they can do, with a little persuasion.
